Overview

This two-day weekend field class explores the oases in and around the Anza Borrego Desert, which is home to a surprisingly wide variety of bird species. This habitat also provides the perfect resting place for migrants such as warblers, flycatchers, grosbeaks, sparrows, hawks and other tired travelers on their way south for the winter. After a zoom lecture on Tuesday night, the class spends Saturday and Sunday in the field, studying both migrant and resident bird species. Participants will learn about: conservation, ecology, natural history and special adaptations to the harsh desert environment.

Participants will need to make their own weekend accommodations. We have acquired a group campsite at Anza Borrego State Park for those who wish to camp and for those that wish to reserve a motel room, please contact us for a list of accommodations in Borrego Springs.

Itinerary

Tuesday, October 18, 7:00 pm – Zoom Meeting

- Welcome, introduction and discussion on bird identification, classification, local families, migration, conservation
- Slide show and preview of weekend activities

Saturday, October 22, 7:30 am – 5 pm

We will meet at the Anza Borrego Natural History Museum, 652 Palm Canyon Dr, Borrego Springs

On Saturday we will drive approximately 75 miles on a loop around and through the Park in search of birds in a variety of habitats, from desert scrub to montane forest. We might even see a Bald Eagle!

Sunday, October 23, 7:30 am – 12:00 pm

We will meet at the Anza Borrego Natural History Museum, 652 Palm Canyon Dr, Borrego Springs

We will bird in the vicinity of Borrego Springs, checking out a number of local birding sites including a sandy, creosote scrub ecosystem with a chance to see LeConte's Thrasher and Swainson's Hawks.

- Whistle

Fitness Requirements

Participants must be in good physical condition for courses/activities in a desert that may be hot, dry, windy, and sometimes surprisingly cold.

Guidelines

- You are responsible for your safety.
- Park your car in designated areas only. Parking along the side of the road is dangerous to you and the environment.
- Rattlesnakes are present in the desert. Avoid contact with wildlife. Put your hands and feet only where you can see them.
- Stay with the group. If you get lost, stay put.
- Before leaving the class, check out with the Desert Institute Representative.
- Drink plenty of water. If you run out, notify the instructor or the Desert Institute Representative.

Instructor Biography

Kurt Leuschner, M.S., Wildlife Ecology, is a Professor of Natural Resources at College of the Desert. Leuschner's specialties include: ornithology, entomology, and desert ecology. He has led hundreds of field trips both locally and as far afield as Africa. He teaches natural history courses for the Desert Institute, UCR Extension, the Desert Studies Center at Zzyzx, the Living Desert, California State Parks, and many other conservation organizations.
